

Historic Clifton

**Kathy Hertz of Clifton, Virginia Receives Daily Points of Life Award – April 8, 2016
AND Volunteer Fairfax, Adult Achievement Award – 250 Hours+ - 2016**

The Clifton Clatter’s “History Column“ this month reflects the story of one of our dynamo volunteer citizens who made history by her tireless efforts in caring for Syrian refugees over this past Holiday Season. Kathy Hertz was recently awarded the National Daily Points of Light award for her humanitarian efforts. She also received the Fairfax County award for Adult Volunteerism in excess of 250 hours for 2015. Kathy will be continuing her good work later on this summer, coordinating a “DCRally4Refugees“ August 28, 2016 (www.dcrally4refugees.org).

Enjoy the article below and attached pictures. They represent Kathy while in Greece and also at the annual Fairfax County Volunteer Service Awards breakfast, where Kathy was presented with these two awards. Also in attendance at the breakfast were Mayor Bill Holloway, Clifton Betterment Association President, Michelle Stein, Kim Bittner, Mary Mills, Jackie Lambertson, then Volunteer Fairfax Board of Directors Vice President, Lynne Garvey-Hodge (who had nominated Kathy), as well as Kathy’s son, Sam Kinter.



While many of us this past Holiday Season were enjoying Fairfax County’s unseasonably warm weather, one of our citizens was standing on the shores of Lesbos, Greece greeting, helping, feeding and comforting thousands of Syrian refugees. Clifton resident, Kathy Hertz has always worked toward community support and improvement. Volunteerism and care for others have been firmly imbedded into her personal core values. Kathy decided that this year she would make a personal difference by intervening herself within a situation most of have viewed with horror: the reality of Syrian refugees. Kathy Hertz had been watching media coverage in Europe as millions fled their homes from Syria, Iraq and Afghanistan. She wished she could do something to

help alleviate the suffering. As a 50-something single mother, supporting herself successfully as a life coach, Kathy knew she had the skills as a humanitarian to help. She learned that there was minimal NGO (Non-Governmental Organization) presence on the Greek island of Lesbos and that most of the assistance to refugees arriving there was provided by individual volunteers who were unaffiliated with any organization: volunteers from all professions and many countries. There was a need for clothing, food, shelter, and of course, compassion.

After researching locations around the Mediterranean, the area around Lesbos, Greece seemed to need the most attention as it is the initial landing point for 60% of the one million refugees who have sought asylum in Europe during last year alone. Kathy provided for her own travel expenses and reached out to dozens of friends, acquaintances, strangers and family who were also passionate about assisting with the refugee crises. Many who are Fairfax County citizens and many neighbors from Kathy’s home base of Clifton and Fairfax Station. Kathy and her cousin received contributions of \$4,000.00, primarily by word of mouth, with the Clifton/Fairfax Station area contributing some \$1,674.00 from over 65 neighbors. Another \$4,000.00 was raised while on location in Greece. A final total of \$8,000.00+ went to aid and support the immediate needs of the landing refugees during the final weeks of 2015.

Upon arrival, Kathy purchased 97 pairs of adult shoes along with her donations of winter coats, gloves, scarves, sox, only to discover that her cache of donations would last but one day. A volunteer named Julio from Spain, had set up a food tent at the refugee camp and some of the funds were spent purchasing food for him to feed those arriving.

Kathy quickly learned that not all refugees were women and children. Many of the men among the crowds who were too proud to allow themselves to be forced into conscription to join ISIS, Taliban, Assad's Army or rebel forces, fled either alone or with their families.

Kathy states, "Looking in people's eyes, putting your hands on their arms or shoulders, or just giving them a hug was our primary way to communicate. In those moments, most of the people would just break down sobbing, finally seeing a caring and kind face and person. It was during those moments that I realized just how much these people were like me, that this could be me in a different time and place. They were mothers, fathers, sons and daughters, all literally running for their lives from horrors too awful to comprehend and without any idea what might lie ahead, but certain that whatever, it had to be better than what was left behind."



When Kathy arrived in December and before even reaching her hotel, she found herself on the beach holding a frightened wet toddler handed to her from an arriving rubber dinghy (meant for 15) that had carried 50 people on the treacherous journey from the coast of Turkey. Most of her mornings were spent this way, helping those arriving in unsafe dinghies. Men, women, children, babies, young old, handicapped, blind, sick, people from all walks of life, arriving cold and wet, many suffering from hypothermia, fear and shock. In the afternoons and evenings, Kathy and Joanne volunteered at a volunteer run camp outside a local government registration center. Called "Better Days for Moria", (aka, "Camp Moria") this group was able to create what neither the Greek government or large Non-Government Organizations (NGO) had been able to achieve. They worked in a food tent, clothing distribution tent, tea tent (that served hot sweet tea and snacks) and a children's tent. This "compound" provided food, shelter & essential services for the refugees who would be there for 2-4 days waiting to be registered. They helped separate arrivers into Syrian, Iraqi, Afghan or "other" categories. Everything required assistance from understanding what was happening in the moment, to how to register and where to go next. There was a constant language barrier, so finding a refugee who could speak even a little English was an enormous help, as s/he could translate for others and help them understand "next steps".

Working in the clothing distribution center was another essential task Kathy took on as most refugees arrived wet and needed warm clothing/protection in order to sleep in tents in the 30' weather. For some, the most help was to be able to help them undress, wrap in plastic wrap and re-dress. Each person took approximately 15 minutes to help and Kathy says, "It was heartbreaking to see people standing in line, wet and freezing and know that all I could do was to keep working."

Some refugees required medical attention, so particulars needed to be identified in order for situations to be resolved. Such was an 8-month pregnant woman with four little children, desperately trying to find a small spot to sleep.

This type of hands-on support is a wonderful testimony to the amazing good will and commitment to volunteerism so prevalent in Fairfax County. Just as our county's incredibly successful Syrian blanket and coat drive has assisted tens of thousands of refugees for several years, Kathy's presence provided human warmth and care! She greeted some 20+ boats each filled with an average of 50 refugees. Her presence upon the arrival of up to two hundred refugees per day on the beach was then matched by the hundreds she assisted at Camp Moria. To assist the life guards who supported the refugees, she used a portion of the financial donations to purchase a new engine for a boat used by a group called PROEM-Aid (Professional Emergency Aid from Seville, Spain). Kathy plans to speak to any interested group who wishes to be informed on the topic of volunteer refugee assistance and to help the public better understand the situation at hand.

Kathy's volunteerism in Clifton has been well-known for over a decade. She has actively sought out opportunities in which she can be of assistance for Clifton's Annual Kid Fest, Clifton's Annual Halloween Haunted Trail Tour, the Clifton 5-K and was an energetic and eager volunteer for Clifton's 100th Anniversary in 2002, when she had first arrived in town. Kathy's energy, vision, compassion, dedication, extraordinary hard work in amazingly harsh and harrowing circumstances, her drive, commitment and above all kindness, made her a perfect Awardee for the both the National Daily Points of Light Award and the 2016 Fairfax County Adult 250+ Hours Volunteer Award!






